

PRESIDENT'S NOTES

The Road to Guilford Courthouse, 18 Mar. 1781, was a long and arduous one filled with surprises and disappointments. The war in the thirteen colonies moved from the north to the south in late 1779. Charleston was under siege in Mar. of 1780. The British sent a young cavalry officer named Banastre Tarleton, to cut off the flow of reinforcements at Monck's Corner. He caught the rebels at night. It was a bloody massacre. He pursued them to Lenud's Ferry and caught them by surprise, again. Shortly after, Ft. Moultrie fell and then the city. Tarleton doggedly pursued Col. Buford's Virginians and surprised them in the backcountry. It was another slaughter. Gen. Horatio Gates, Hero of Saratoga, took command of the south and lost his fame at the Battle of Camden. He was replaced by Gen. Nathaniel Greene, who split his forces. He sent Col. Morgan out to harass the British. In the meantime, Major Patrick Ferguson led southern loyalists on their own harassment program. They pushed the rebel Mountain Men too far and met their demise at King's Mountain. Tarleton cornered Morgan at The Cowpens and was defeated. Cornwallis chased Morgan almost to Virginia where Greene confronted him at Guilford Courthouse. Although Cornwallis won the ground, he had to retreat to Yorktown, his demise.

We are off and running for a new year and I need your help more than ever to make everything that we have planned to make this chapter stand out and be recognized. We won a number of awards at this last state convention but the competition is stiff. We need you to represent the chapter at every possible event in our area. President Hoyt informed the Chapter about the passing of Compatriot Louis Segaloff in the early morning of March 7th while in the hospital. Compatriot Segaloff had requested no obituary or funeral. The Chapter will honor his memory in the April meeting with a special "Broken Arrow" ceremony. He was ninety years old.

President Hoyt explained the absence of Chaplain Jerry Bullock. He had taken a bad fall several days ago and was not able to travel.

It was announced by Lt. Gen. Polk that the Audit Committee had found the Operating Account and Scholarship Account to be in order and recommended approval. It was passed unanimously. In November, Compatriot William Tart passed away. In his memory his daughter, Linda Hook, presented a check to the Treasurer for the Scholarship Fund. Also, printouts of the annual budget were passed out and after discussion the budget passed unanimously.

The winning title for the Chapter Newsletter was submitted by Compatriot Jerry Bullock who consequently won \$25. The new title will be "The Hightower Recorder" and will be used beginning with the April 2017 Newsletter. Milynn Tate is in her 7th year of compiling the Newsletter and is ending her tenure with this March Newsletter. It is not yet known who will be her successor.

The Chapter was pleased to honor Compatriot Don Chandler with the Bronze Good Citizenship Award. He is one of the most active members and also one of the most "senior" members at the age of 92.5 years of age. Because of his exemplary career we are presenting his biography here in full:

The President of the William Hightower Chapter #35, TXSSAR is authorized and honored to present the GCM to Allen Donald Chandler, Jr., for his distinguished service to the community and country from June 1941 to 9 Mar 2017. During this period, Donald graduated from high school in Galveston, TX, where he was Class President for



his Junior and Senior years. He attended TCU, then the University of TX, where he graduated with a BA and MA. He was ROTC Corp Commander and a Distinguished Military Graduate. He joined the 43rd Division in 1943 and served in New Guinea in the Pacific Theater until mustered out in Jan 1946. Donald served four year with AT&T and 3 years as a VP in an Austin Drug chain. From there, he started his own company in San Antonio where he was the CEO of six offices and 150 employees. He sold the business and retired in 1982. He has participated in Senior Olympics between 1991 and 1998 where he won medals in discus, shot put, javelin, sprint and long jump. He is the former State President of TX Association of

Polygraph Examiners and President of the Security Association. He has been a deacon in his church for the last 35 years. Donald has dedicated himself to his community. His unselfish devotion to achieving his goals while giving back to his country and community warrants recognition by this award.
